# December Skipper 2022

#### **Dismissal Reminders:**

There is a pause at the door between 3:15-4:10 each day as staff is engaged in dismissal procedures. All notes for early dismissal are to be submitted by email or handwritten note by noon daily. This allows for the office and classroom teachers adequate time to communicate student change in dismissal.



#### Car Rider area during Dismissal time:

Car Rider Window Tags are to be displayed from your rearview mirror each day for pick up. Without the tag displayed, you will be prompted to park your vehicle and report to the main office with your driver's' license to sign your child out. This is a safety protocol in place.

Once you are in a line, do not move from one lane to the next even if you see a lane starting to get shorter. What is happening is one lane is now able to leave where students were loaded into their vehicles. While they are pulling off, students for the other lane is being escorted out to prepare to be loaded in those vehicles. We alternate from the inside loop to the outside loop to keep both lanes moving. If you switch lanes, your child will not be lined up in the correct line to be escorted out. You will be delaying the time your child is escorted to your vehicle as we work to figure out where they fit into the lines that are set to be escorted out. You will be prompted to park your vehicle as they work to locate your child and escort to you once a staff member becomes available.

Finally, right turn only when entering or exiting the parking lot. This ensures the flow of traffic continues and accidents are avoided. Doing otherwise could also cause a traffic halt for both cars and buses where vehicles will be in what could be called a 'grid lock.'

Adults picking students up in the afternoon are asked to remain in their vehicles for your safety and flow of the car rider lines moving forward as students are loaded into your vehicles.



Wicomico Schools is collaborating with the Wicomico County Health Department to have convenient, school based FluMist vaccine clinics in all of our elementary schools to support the health of young students. Please note that any child who has asthma or any significant underlying health condition (heart disease, metabolic disorders, kidney disease, cognitive dysfunction, seizure disorders) or is immune compromised should not receive FluMist, the child's doctor can advise about a flu shot.

#### Warm coats and clothing reminders:

Students go outside for recess daily. Please be sure students are wearing winter coats this time of year. If you need assistance with a winter coat, email mjohanni@wcboe.org (Mrs. Johanning, Guidance).

Additionally, we have depleted the new clothing used to change students when they have accidents. If your child is working with the school to potty train them, be sure to send 2 sets of clothes. Contact the classroom teachers to be sure they have ample supply of pull up and wipes.

ALL articles of clothing need to have your child's first name and last name written on the tag inside. We are not able to return clothes to students if they misplace them when not labeled. Unclaimed clothes are donated to shelters each midterm and end of term after efforts to get them returned to students is unsuccessful. Unfortunately, we do not have the space to hold onto lost items for the amount we are accumulating in a 4-week period.

Thank you for helping us to help you by labeling your child's clothing.





By now, we are all aware that attending school is mandatory. We are also aware of the direct correlation between school attendance and student performance. The reason I am addressing this issue is to encourage your child to attend school every day, on time, and ready to learn. Teachers teach something new every day.

If a child is absent due to an illness, death in the family, etc., we encourage parents to contact the school for make-up work. When the request comes in, the teacher will put together a packet of make-up work. This will give the student written work to complete during the night. This will help keep the student on track for the next day. Unfortunately, we cannot duplicate the rich classroom discussions, questions, and answers that are generated through the teaching process. For this reason, we ask that you only keep your child home for legitimate or medical reasons.

As a reminder, when absent, we require that a note be sent to school describing why the student was absent. When no note is received, the absence is marked as "unexcused". When a student reaches 10 days of unexcused absences for the marking term, they may be at risk for failure and a conference must be held with an administrator or home/school liaison. If a student exceeds 15 days of unexcused absences for the year, the school will seek court action against the parent.

#### **Family Vacations:**

At times throughout the year, parents have notified the school that they are planning a family vacation during the school year. Although the Code of Maryland Regulations states that absences due to trips or vacations are considered "unexcused" absences, the new Wicomico County Attendance Policy allows schools to consider excusing up to 3 days per year for this purpose depending on the child's current and past attendance history.

If you are planning a vacation while school is in session, please contact Mrs. Phillips in the office for a "Parent Request for Non-Emergency Absence Form". This form must be returned to the office for approval prior to the trip. If approval is given by the administration, students will be asked to complete a "Vacation Journal" during the trip to summarize activities done on each day. Once the journal is returned to the office following the trip, the days will be converted to "excused".

Please note that teachers are not required to supply work during this absence but in most instances, they will work with you to give you guidelines on what topics will be covered. Because instructional plans change daily, teachers may not be able to give you worksheets, exact homework pages, etc.

#### **Family Portal Now Open**

Family Portal provides information for parents and guardians and students on grades, assignments, attendance and other details. The Family Portal is also where mid-term progress reports and report cards will be posted for downloading by families. The portal opened on Aug. 29, 2022, and will remain open until June 30, 2023, for the convenience of students and families.

A unique login ID and password are assigned to the parent/guardian. Please note that there is a new login formula for parents and guardians this year.

A login ID and password are assigned to each student.

Please note that for security reasons, all passwords from 2021-2022 have been reset.



For your convenience, we have provided the method you can use to gain access. Please contact your child's school if you need assistance with the login ID and password or need a translated copy of the instructions.

#### Family Portal for Parents/Guardians (please note new formula for login):

Login ID: student's full last name (all lower case, special characters and spaces removed, not to exceed 14 characters) + last five digits of student's local ID number (printed on schedule or report card) + first initial of student first name

Password: Student's 5-digit lunch number (available from your student or call the school). This is temporary; the parent will choose a new password the first time they log on.

Example: Your student is John A. Smith-Jones with the local student ID number of 110098765. John's lunch number is 23456. The login id will be smithjones98765j and the temporary password is 23456.

# Kindergarten

This month in ELA we will are exploring word parts such as syllables and onset and rime. We will read books that center around the holiday season. Students will also continue to work on writing 2-3 sentences about an object using high frequency and color words they know.

As mathematicians we will continue to explore teen numbers, addition to 10, counting forward from a given number, and counting to 100 by 10's and 1's.

For Social Studies this month we will be exploring various cultures and holidays celebrated around the world. We will continue with our civics unit.

#### **Reminders:**

- Please continue to review sight words nightly with your child.
- Please continue to send water bottles and a winter coat to school with your child.

### PreK 3

Three-year-olds are learning to do many things independently. It is important that we begin to establish safe and healthy routines that they will maintain throughout their lives. Over the next few weeks, we will be talking about safety rules to help children as they make their own choices, practices that will help them stay healthy, and information about food and exercise to keep their bodies growing and strong.

#### Grade 1

ELA: This month we will continue to increase our phonics knowledge by working on r-blends and 3-letter blends. We are also working on developing our sight word vocabulary. We will continue to work on our comprehension skills through our read alouds and small group work. This month we will also learn about holiday traditions around the world through our "trip" on the Polar Express. Please continue to review your child's weekly sight words at home and read with your child each night.

#### Grade 2

ELA: Second graders have explored folktales and fables with a focus on identifying the moral of the story. We have continued reading and spelling words with predictable vowel teams, and have worked with understanding words with prefixes and suffixes. We are responding to text in our readers' notebooks, and are strengthening our skills through the iReady MyPath.

Math: We completed unit 3 and have started unit 4. In Unit 4 we will use mental math strategies to solve addition and subtraction problems. We will tell time to the nearest 5 minutes. Students will identify the place value of numbers and we will begin measurement. Please continue to work on fact fluency at home with numbers up to 20.

<u>Social Studies</u>: Second grade has started our social studies unit. This unit is all about citizenship.

# Media

Students have been learning about fiction and nonfiction genres, locating books in the library, character traits, and predictions.


Pre-K students have been learning about shapes and holidays.




