#### **Early Dismissal Days**

Parents are reminded that November 7th, February 17th, and March 17th are early dismissal days for students. Dismissal will begin at 12:45 pm on early dismissal days.


#### **Student Pick Up Clarification:**

We have had a few questions regarding students being picked up by friends or family members at the end of the day. Our policy has always been that students will only be dismissed to a non-custodial parent or relative/friend if a note is sent into school by the custodial parent. Phone call requests are not accepted. Students will not be dismissed to "emergency contacts" listed on the Personal Data Form at the end of the day if no note is produced. Adults listed as "emergency contacts" are only contacted if a student is sick or injured during the school day and parents cannot be contacted.

#### **School Messenger Phone System**

Each week, you will receive phone calls from our administrators and/or teachers using our automated calling system. The technology used to make those calls is called School Messenger. School messenger is a web-based notification service used by the Board of Education to deliver messages in a matter of minutes. The type of messages that can be sent are endless but include absence notifications, reminders, fog delays, school closings, and other general information. This system is also in place to notify parents in the unfortunate event of an emergency or lock-down at the school.

To be included in the calls, we must have an updated primary phone number at school. If your phone number changes throughout the year, please send in a note to the office so we can update our records.





By now, we are all aware that attending school is mandatory. We are also aware of the direct correlation between school attendance and student performance. The reason I am addressing this issue is to encourage your child to attend school every day, on time, and ready to learn. Teachers teach something new every day.

If a child is absent due to an illness, death in the family, etc., we encourage parents to contact the school for make-up work. When the request comes in, the teacher will put together a packet of make-up work. This will give the student written work to complete during the night. This will help keep the student on track for the next day. Unfortunately, we cannot duplicate the rich classroom discussions, questions, and answers that are generated through the teaching process. For this reason, we ask that you only keep your child home for legitimate or medical reasons.

As a reminder, when absent, we require that a note be sent to school describing why the student was absent. When no note is received, the absence is marked as "unexcused". When a student reaches 10 days of unexcused absences for the marking term, they may be at risk for failure and a conference must be held with an administrator or home/school liaison. If a student exceeds 15 days of unexcused absences for the year, the school will seek court action against the parent.

#### **Family Vacations:**

At times throughout the year, parents have notified the school that they are planning a family vacation during the school year. Although the Code of Maryland Regulations states that absences due to trips or vacations are considered "unexcused" absences, the new Wicomico County Attendance Policy allows schools to consider excusing up to 3 days per year for this purpose depending on the child's current and past attendance history.

If you are planning a vacation while school is in session, please contact Mrs. Phillips in the office for a "Parent Request for Non-Emergency Absence Form". This form must be returned to the office for approval prior to the trip. If approval is given by the administration, students will be asked to complete a "Vacation Journal" during the trip to summarize activities done on each day. Once the journal is returned to the office following the trip, the days will be converted to "excused".

Please note that teachers are not required to supply work during this absence but in most instances, they will work with you to give you guidelines on what topics will be covered. Because instructional plans change daily, teachers may not be able to give you worksheets, exact homework pages, etc.

#### **Family Portal Now Open**

Family Portal provides information for parents and guardians and students on grades, assignments, attendance and other details. The Family Portal is also where mid-term progress reports and report cards will be posted for downloading by families. The portal opened on Aug. 29, 2022, and will remain open until June 30, 2023, for the convenience of students and families.

A unique login ID and password are assigned to the parent/guardian. Please note that there is a new login formula for parents and guardians this year.

A login ID and password are assigned to each student.

Please note that for security reasons, all passwords from 2021-2022 have been reset.



For your convenience, we have provided the method you can use to gain access. Please contact your child's school if you need assistance with the login ID and password or need a translated copy of the instructions.

#### Family Portal for Parents/Guardians (please note new formula for login):

Login ID: student's full last name (all lower case, special characters and spaces removed, not to exceed 14 characters) + last five digits of student's local ID number (printed on schedule or report card) + first initial of student first name

Password: Student's 5-digit lunch number (available from your student or call the school). This is temporary; the parent will choose a new password the first time they log on.

Example: Your student is John A. Smith-Jones with the local student ID number of 110098765. John's lunch number is 23456. The login id will be smithjones98765j and the temporary password is 23456.

## Kindergarten

Dear Kindergarten Families,

- This month in ELA we will begin reading seasonal favorites. As readers we will discuss the characters in a story as well as retell key details in stories we have read together.
- Please continue to review letters and sounds with your child. We are starting to practice stretching out CVC words (consonant - vowel - consonant).
   Students should be able to identify upper and lowercase letters as well as their corresponding sound.
- As mathematicians, we will continue to explore 2D and 3D shapes, addition and subtraction number stories, and continue to practice writing our numbers 1-20. Please practice counting to 100 with your child by 10's and 1's.
- In science we are exploring weather patterns and hazardous weather. We will also take a trip to the Salisbury University Ward Museum to learn about our local watershed.
- In the month of November, we will write and talk about things we are thankful for.

## **Reminders:**

- -Please check your child's take-home folder nightly & review work with your child.
- -As the weather begins to get colder, we will continue to go outside for recess. Please make sure your child comes to school with a coat on these days.

### Grade 1

Math: Students will continue to use addition and subtraction to model and solve number stories. Students will also connect counting to addition and subtraction.

Social Studies: Students shall inquire about the historical development of the fundamental concepts and processes of authority, power, and influence with particular emphasis on civic reasoning in order to become informed, responsible citizens, engage in the political process, and contribute to society.

Reading: Throughout November we will continue to work on building our foundational phonics skills with a focus on initial and final blends. We will revisit these skills in small groups in additional to our 95% Phonics program. We will also continue to develop our vocabulary and reading comprehension skills through the use of Interactive Read Alouds, Shared Readings, and poetry. We will utilize small groups to develop these skills as well. We will also continue working on developing our sight word knowledge to help build reading fluency. Students will also have the opportunity to write narrative and informational pieces.



#### Grade 2

ELA: During the past month, the boys and girls have worked on narrative writing and revising and editing. They have enjoyed stories about family, happy memories, living and working together and other fiction and nonfiction texts. They have learned about story characters, story structure and story setting. The students have worked with initial and final blends, digraphs, silent e, the floss rule and syllables. The students have learned how to share their reading in their readers' notebooks.

Math: We have been very busy in math this past month. Our focus has been on different math strategies, such as making combinations of 10, skip counting, exploring base ten blocks, making doubles and near doubles. Students also practiced making number stories (word problems), counting money and comparing numbers using the greater than, less than, and equal to symbols. Please continue to practice math facts at home with your child.

Science: In science students have investigated matter (solid and liquid) and have identified the different properties of matter. Students completed experiments on reversible and irreversible change with melting crayons and cooking pasta.

Second graders have enjoyed character day, a field trip to The Children's Concert and a PBIS incentive.

## Media

Students have been learning about taking care of books, fiction and nonfiction genres, and locating books in the library. 1st and 2nd grade have done great jobs checking out and returning books so far this year. Kindergarten students are getting ready to start checking out books this month!

Our fall Book Fair just ended and it was an enormous success! Thank you to all who helped and supported it.

## Music



PreK3 and PreK4 Musicians are quickly adding to their music vocabulary and experiences. Recently, they have been learning to move, play, and identify fast/slow music and high/low music. In addition to their ears, they have been using instruments and their bodies to play and move to the steady beat.

Kindergarten Musicians have made a lot of growth in the past few weeks. They have finished singing and playing a new instrument with each animal on the music farm. They have also been practicing using their bodies to move safely in the music room. I am so proud of the improvements I have observed and heard in their classrooms!

First Grade Musicians have been focused on their singing voices and soon will be moving onto rhythm. They have been using instruments and their bodies to keep the steady beat, and sang short solos for the class using puppets. I am proud of the continued improvements I observed in their steady beat performance!

Second Grade Musicians reviewed moving and playing a steady beat, and it was fun watching them use their skills to bounce the steady beat with a playground ball. They have now jumped into rhythm reading by speaking and playing rhythms with quarter notes, eighth notes, and quarter rests. I am looking forward to hearing them continue singing and learning how to compose their own rhythms!

PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions & Supports) is used to promote and improve students' safety and behavior at school.


Students participate in daily restorative circles where we review social skills, expectations, and how to be a part of a school community.
